Rancho Largo, co-owned and managed by Grady Grissom, has been selected as the recipient of the 2017 Colorado Leopold Conservation Award.

ARVADA, Colo. – Rancho Largo, co-owned and managed by Grady Grissom, has been selected as the recipient of the 2017 Colorado Leopold Conservation Award.

The prestigious award is presented annually by Sand County Foundation, the Colorado Cattlemen's Association, the Colorado Cattlemen's Agricultural Land Trust, Tri-State Generation and Transmission Association, and American AgCredit.

Given in honor of renowned conservationist Aldo Leopold, the Leopold Conservation Award recognizes extraordinary achievement in voluntary conservation. It inspires other landowners through these examples and provides a visible forum where farmers, ranchers and other private landowners are recognized as conservation leaders. In his influential 1949 book, "A Sand County Almanac," Leopold called for an ethical relationship between people and the land they own and manage, which he called "an evolutionary possibility and an ecological necessity."

Located in Fowler, Rancho Largo is a cow/calf operation that emphasizes adaptive grazing and biodiversity. The adaptive grazing practices on the ranch have led to increased abundance of plants such as western wheat grass and New Mexico feather grass. The increased plant diversity has also led to improved water retention and has reduced soil erosion. A strong believer in education and communication, Grissom views his 36 pastures as laboratories where he can compare the effects of graze periods; and the ranch hosts many students and fellow ranchers to help educate others on how working with nature and having a productive working ranch can go hand-in-hand.

The \$10,000 award, and a crystal depicting Aldo Leopold, will be presented to Grissom at the Colorado Cattlemen's Association annual convention in Grand Junction on June 12.

"Our congratulations to Grady Grissom and Rancho Largo Ranch," said Tim Lehmann, President of Colorado Cattlemen's Association. "The quality of applicants made the decision to choose just one recipient a real challenge. In the end, this award properly recognizes the stewardship of working ranches and the outright benefit those ranches bring to the environment," Lehmann continued.
